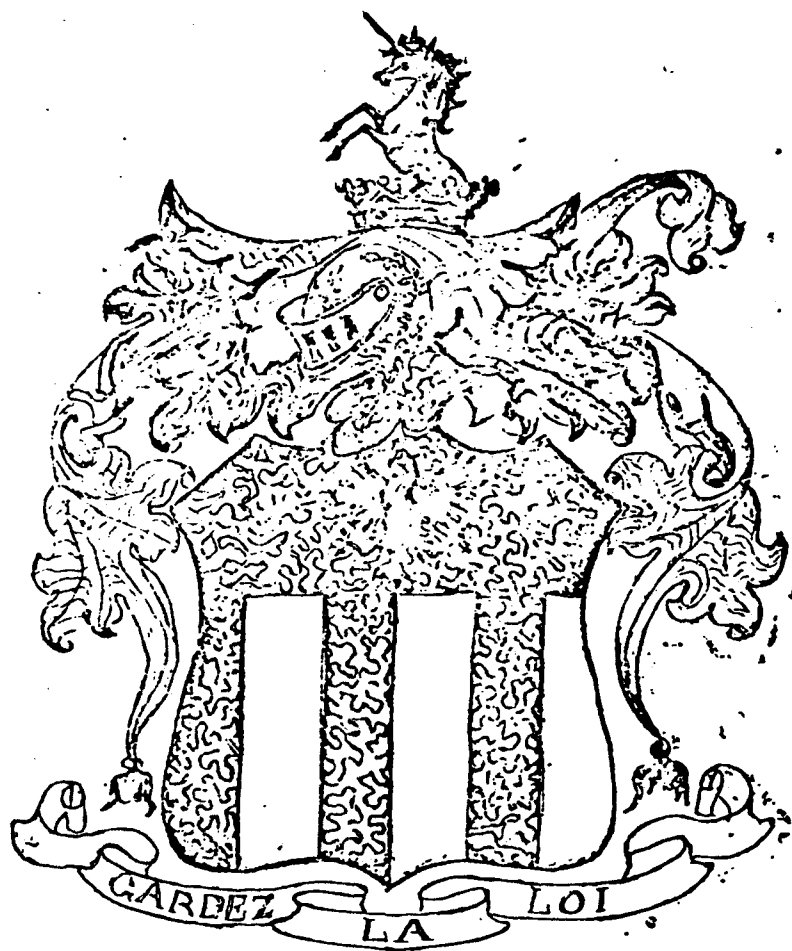

AUTHORS FORWARD

When I began compiling data on my Curd ancestry some two years ago, I did not believe that enough information could be gathered for another printed edition on them. Mr. Frank D. Fuller's fine book, The Curd Family in America, had been very completely compiled on every branch of the Curd family.

I have received such fine cooperation that I now submit this booklet on the descendents of Edmund Curd of Goochland County, Virginia to help up-date Mr. Fuller's genealogy of our family. It is true, as all genealogists experience, that in a few cases there was some indifference and sometimes our fellow kinsman did not cooperate with me as well as might be expected, but in the vast majority of cases, fine and complete data was sent to me on each family. It is our duty if we have any kind of family pride to place in print the names and respective dates and personality traits of our forebears.

I have prepared this booklet in such a manner that I hope it may be afforded by all. Book genealogies are expensive to print and often prices are high.

Since new data is coming in constantly, I plan to issue a yearly Addendum to this genealogy until the branches seem complete. Any new data that the reader may find on the Curds or allied families would be greatly appreciated by this author.

I have tried to give proper recognition to all who have contributed toward this publication, and for any "sins of omission", I give my sincere regrets. At this time, I would like to give special thanks to the following people, who have contributed extremely large amounts of valuable information: Mrs. Ola J. Graham of Murray, Kentucky, who really started me in this research; Mr. William S. Curd of Brownsburg, Indiana, for his fine memory of Curd family lore; Mrs. Mary Ellen Leathers of San Antonio, Texas, for her cooperation and additional information on this branch of the Curds; and to all other too numerous to mention in this short space that have given help and encouragement.

OUR CURD ANCESTRY

"There is a moral and philosophical respect for our ancestors which elevates the character and improves the heart!" This line was spoken well over a hundred years ago by Daniel Webster, the famous orator. The world has turned over many times since he spoke that line, but its truth has never faded. For those of us descended from the Curds, it has special meaning.

The Curds are of Scotch ancestry, to the manor born. Early in the history of this country, they proved their courage and love for democracy. While the parentage of our earliest known ancestor, Edmund Curd, has never been found, it is surely certain that his forebears were of the same fine ideals and virtues as those of the other early Curds.

Our forebear Edmund Curd, is almost unheard of before 1800. The only record found of him before that time was in a Shelby County, Kentucky deed in 1799. He was born in Goochland County, ~~Kentucky~~ ^{Virginia} in 1772. Goochland County served as the emigration point for many of the early Curd families and it was no doubt one of these families that were the parents of our Edmund.

In 1800, Edmund Curd married Mildred Hereford, pronounced Hur-ford. Her ancestors were of the fine old English and Virginia family being her maiden name. At the time of their marriage, Edmund and Milly, as she was called, were residing in Shelby County, Kentucky. Here he farmed and was active in civic affairs. About 1807, they moved to nearby Logan County. Between 1800 and 1814, Edmund and Milly had some 6 children, all of whom lived to become adults of distinction.

Before 1815, Milly Curd died of a disease she had contracted. Edmund remained a widower for about two years. In 1817, on a visit to Robertson County, Tennessee, he became acquainted with the Grizzard family, who had come to Tennessee from his native state of Virginia. One of the Grizzard girls, Mary, or Polly, as she was called, caught the fancy of Edmund's eye. They were married soon after and again began raising a family. Edmund's oldest son, Richard Curd, had accompanied his father on this journey to Tennessee and there had met a younger daughter in the Grizzard family, Zilpha. They were also married soon after. Hence, Polly was not only Richard's step-mother, but his sister-in-law as well.

unheard of before 1800. The only record found of him before that time was in a Shelby County, Kentucky deed. Edmund was required to sell the land he was granted to the highest bidder. Each alternate section was put up for sale. Some land brought as high as a dollar and acre, while the lowest price it brought was 10¢ and an acre. Edmund was able to buy land extremely cheap, and he built up a large estate. He received over 300 grants in the 7 years he was land commissioner.

In 1800, Edmund Curd married Mildred Hereford, pronounced Hur-ford. Her ancestors were of the fine old English and Virginia family being her maiden name. At the time of their marriage, Edmund and Milly, as she was called, were residing in Shelby County, Kentucky. Here he farmed and was active in civic affairs. About 1807, they moved to nearby Logan County.

It was during these years that large numbers of settlers came to Calloway County to receive these land grants and many of the oldest families in Calloway had their beginnings there immediately after the Jackson Purchase was made. Calloway County had been named for Colonel Richard Calloway, an early settler of the state of Kentucky and one of its finest citizens. It was during this early period of colonization that such small towns as Coldwater, Backers Burg, Pottertown, Penny, Stella, Faxon, Cherry Corner, and many others were established in Calloway. Most of these are no longer in existence today.

New Providence in Calloway County must rightly be called the home of our early Curds. New Providence acquired its name from the people who had come from old Providence, near Easter, Kentucky, and who had started this small town. Here in this village, consisting of little more than a stable and a store, our Curd forebears carried out what business they had to do. The reader must remember that all, or nearly all, these early people lived on farms and a trip to the village was something special. To be able to go to Murray, after it was founded in 1842, was something extra special to them.

After serving out two terms as land commissioner, Edmund Curd retired to his farm, where he led the comfortable life of a farmer and he had the company of his wife and children to pass away the days. Here he continued to live until 1846. That year, the road of life ended for Edmund Curd and he was buried near his farm.

Before leaving this fine forebear, we cannot overlook his personal features. While no picture of him exists today to this author's knowledge, he was no doubt around 5 feet, 10 inches in height, with a medium build. He probably had blue eyes, which is a trait of the Curd family, and he may have had red hair, which is another characteristic of our Curds. The redness of our Curds' hair is a very beautiful, deep, rich red and, although it may have lost some of its richness with the intermingling of other lines, many descendants today still possess that redness of hair. This priceless heirloom is in the hands of Mr. Richard Cutchin (Dick) Barclay, of Arlington, Kentucky. He is a descendant of Edmund through Edmund's son Joel Hawes Curd. She is a descendant of Edmund through Edmund's second son, Charles Curd, whose daughter, Martha Adeline Curd, married John Louis Utterback, a 2-great-uncle of this author. In 1915, Mary Hollingsworth, a daughter of Elizabeth Curd Hollingsworth and granddaughter of Edmund Curd, also had in her possession a large silver soup ladle that had been owned by Mary Grizzard Curd. with perfect exactness of Spanish silver dollars, all inlaid in a circle to this heirloom, he believes it is probably owned now by a descendant of Mary Hollingsworth who values it highly.

While space will not allow a full biography on each of the children of ~~William~~ Edmund Curd, we must not fail to give mention to their fine accomplishments in their lives. They were active in every phase of private and public life and they left an indelible impression on Calloway County.

Amos Miller's father
Charles Curd, the son of Edmund and Mildred Hereford Curd, gave the land on which Murray, the county seat today, was built. One day, in the early 1840's, as the stage coach between Paris and Paducah drew up near what is now the Courthouse Square; the passengers saw a young negro cleaning out the underbrush of a wilderness. "Hey, what are you doing there, boy," asked one of the passengers. "Jes cleanin off de ground, for here is where Massa Charles is goin to build himself a town," replied the negro. And so it was. The name of this young negro was Steave and he was later sold to the Scruggs family for \$1500 and under that name lived to a great age in a little cabin adjoining the city cemetery. His only male descendent was named Edmund, in honor of his master's father. This Edmund neither reflected great honor on the Curds or himself as he was sent twice to Eddyville as an inmate of the state for a fixed time set by a jury of his peers. In every family there is a black sheep. Edmund was black.

Edward Curd, the third son of Edmund and Milly, attained distinction as Captain of Company G, 16th United States Infantry in the Mexican War. He was a courageous and noted soldier of his time. He was also elected to represent Calloway and Marshall Counties in the Constitutional Convention of 1849-50. While he died at the young age of 49 years, he had accomplished much in his lifetime.

William Hardy Curd, the first child of Edmund and his second wife Mary Grizzard, was perhaps the most noted of Edmund's children. He was widely known for his land holdings and his activity in the slave market. He was early a resident of the Republic of Texas, coming there about 1838. However, the old state house had been destroyed by fire and the surveyor's record of the location of his land was lost also. William had sworn allegiance to the Republic of Texas and he vainly searched for some clue as to the whereabouts of his land. When he was unable to find anything, he returned to Kentucky where he met and married Frances Jane Hill in 1840. She died shortly afterward and William returned to Calloway County. In 1842, he met and married Emily Jane Bailey of Todd County, Kentucky and they began to raise a family of 12 children.

William H. Curd had acquired a large amount of land when his father had died and he continued to buy land as did his brother Joel Hawes Curd. By 1860, he and Joel owned one-fourth of all the land in Kentucky west of the Tennessee River, covering 7 counties and it has been

said that if the War Between the States had come one year later, the estate of William Hardy Curd would have been worth over a million dollars. In addition to his land, W.H. Curd had much money in slaves. He was noted for his kind and generous treatment of his negroes. They had good housing, good food, good medical attention and many other good things, because they were worth a great deal of money. An individual negro would bring anywhere from \$800 to \$2500, depending on the individual. Thus, the masters were obliged to care for them well, since each time one of them died, the owner lost a substantial investment. The slave auctions then were held in St. Louis, Missouri. A man would be sent ahead to arrange lodging and then the buyers would fill the town. An old man once related to a correspondent of this author, a very interesting story. He related this back in 1914. This man, with tears of nostalgia in his eyes, recalled how he had seen William Hardy Curd walk away from the slave auctions leading a march of over 700 negroes, each riding a mule, to be "sold down the river." His personal slaves numbered over 2000 at one time and W.H. Curd was said to be the largest slave owner in the entire South. After the Emancipation Proclamation was made known, the then freed slaves of W.H. Curd came in one mass to the main house. When William came out the spokesman for them said, "Massa Will, we would'nt leave you for all de proclamations in de world!" It has been said that "Massa Will" shed tears of deep emotion at his slaves loyalty and at that moment he knew his kindnesses had not been in vain.

During the War Between the States, the Union soldiers burned W.H. Curd's mill and distillery in Murray, which was a severe blow to him. He lost much of his estate during the war and after the war was over, new taxes were levied on lands in the old Jackson Purchase. Since he was unable to pay these high taxes, the land of the Curds was declared open to the public. It was like the Oklahoma land rushes, only the rush was on Curd land instead of government land. These settlers were given "quit claim deeds" to Curd land and a person named Curd might be shot on sight by those who had received these grants. In 1843, this author's great-great-grandfather, Harrison Peyton Utterback, built the First Christian Church of Murray. Among the first members were the W.H. Curds. In the 1850's, W.H. Curd put much money into the church. The death of Peyton Utterback and other leading spirits of the congregation had put the church in dire financial troubles and it was feared that the church might have to be disbanded. But with W.H. Curd's help and that of the rest of the congregation, the church continued. William H. Curd was recorder for the church for many years. He begins his writings in 1856 with his "Prefactory Remarks" and continues at intervals for about 15 years, until he was relieved by another. In 1850, we find that William Hardy Curd was a new member of Murray Lodge #105, Free and Accepted Masons. His brothers Joel, Hawed Curd and Edmund Grizzard Curd later became members of the Lodge, and his half-brothers, Charles and Edward Curd were already active members when William joined. William suspended twice for non-payment of dues, but was again reinstated each time. He was never seen without the key-stone of the Royal Arch Masons pinned to his lapel and all the extant, his kindnesses had not been in vain.

During the War Between the States, the Union soldiers burned W.H. Curd's mill and distillery in Murray, which was a severe blow to

pictures of him show this pin in his lapel. He and his half-brothers and brothers were members of this lodge in company with other men of their time, such as W.G.Irvan, Robert Watkins, C.A.Duncan, Thomas McElrath, Robertson Fair, W.F.Fair, and many other men.

The unusual death of Emily Jane Bailey Curd, wife of W.H.Curd and the story surrounding it must not fail to be told. After all their children had married and left home with the exception of Jefferson Emmett Curd, their youngest son, and Paron Ann("Teeny")Curd, their youngest daughter, William and Emily decided to take in a homeless man to live with them. He remained in their home several years and during this time he gradually lost his mind. He contrived a wild idea about having more authority in the household if Emily were dead.

Emily was troubled with digestion and each evening she took medicine to relieve it. She never had to light a lamp, as she knew exactly where the medicine was in the cabinet. On the evening of January 15, 1888, she went to the cabinet as usual to take her powders. On this evening, however, their insane boarder had put "Rough-on-Rats" poison in the place of her prescription. She took the poison unknowingly and immediately began to feel its effects. Her son Emmett rode all night for doctors, but it was too late and she died on the morning of January 16, 1888. She was laid to rest in the family plot a few days later. As for the murderer, he was not prosecuted, but was forced to leave the county.

After the death of his wife, William H. Curd went to live with his second son, Thomas Garvin Curd. On the morning of January 19, 1894, his daughter Paron Ann(Teeny)Curd Utterback came to visit him. As they talked of old times, William said, "Teeny, how long has it been since Emily died?" "Six years," replied Teeny. "Then I have lived six years too long," said William Hardy Curd. He folded his hands and closed his eyes. Teeny left the room and when she returned, he had passed away, almost as if he had willed his own time of death. He died a broken man, but a highly respected one and, because of his modesty, few people knew what this one man had endured in his lifetime and what riches had once been his.

On Joel Hawes Curd, much has been stated above. He was another landed aristocrat of the Curd family and also a large slave owner. On Edmund Grizzard Curd, brother of Joel and William, little is known, except that he did marry twice and went to live in Graves County, Ky.

The female children of Edmund Curd were known as extremely fine women and good wives. They raised their families and served their husbands in the fine Curd style and, while this author has no detailed information on their lives, he is sure they were women of the highest virtues. Most of the Curd men raised large families, and the women were no exception, so there are many descendants of the female Curds living today. How often they must meet under different names arising from marriage and never know their kinship to each other!

In summing up, it may be said that the Curd family is a very noble one and, while none of our family has ever reached the zenith of fame, they are of a better than average stock and many have attained positions of respect and responsibility in the professions. Many are doctors and lawyers, while others are in the skilled labor fields. The Curds are just plain, honest hard-working people and it is this type of people that has formed the history of our great nation.

OUR BAILEY ANCESTRY

Since William Hardy Curd and his brother Joel Hawes Curd married Bailey sisters, it is fitting that some mention of the Bailey ancestry be mentioned.

The Baileys came from Georgia originally. The earliest known ancestor on our Bailey line is Thomas Bailey, born about 1765. Around 1794, he came to Todd County, Kentucky in company with Thomas Garvin and other early settlers.

Thomas Bailey married Jane ?(maiden name undiscovered) about 1785 and had a number of children, two of whom were noted for their activity in the county of Todd. John Armstrong Bailey, the oldest son of Thomas Bailey, was the father of the two Bailey girls who married the Curds.

John Armstrong Bailey was born in 1791 in Georgia. He came with his parents to Kentucky at a young age. His father died when John was 19, and he was obliged to help raise his youngest brother, Thomas Garvin Bailey. After his mother died, John took over full responsibility for young Thomas and in 1828 he released Thomas from his guardianship.

John, his brother Charles Allen Bailey and others in Todd County often went on hunting trips in the fall. They would hunt in the unexplored regions of the county, where game was plentiful. They sometimes went twice in the same fall, always returning with many pelts and much meat.

John A. Bailey married Patsy Coleman on January 29, 1820 in Christian County, Kentucky and she was the mother of both Emily Jane and Mary Sarene(Polly)Bailey. Patsy Coleman Bailey died about 1835 and John married Martha ? By this marriage, he had two more children. He and his first wife, Patsy, had had 7 children.

The Baileys were prominent early settlers of both Todd and Logan Counties, Kentucky and the family was highly respected. They seemed to have been as fine a people as the Curds and it was natural that these two families would be acquainted with each other and later marry among them.

While this author shall not present any detailed sketch of each of the children of John Armstrong Bailey, it is doubtless that they were all of the highest caliber and served their country well.

OUR GRIZZARD ANCESTRY

The Grizzards are of Scotch origin, as are the Curds. They came to America early in the 18th Century and took up residence in Virginia.

South Hampton and Sussex Counties were the homes of our early Grizzard forebears. Here they lived from 1700 until about 1798, when one of our Grizzard forebears removed to Robertson County, Tennessee.

Ambrose Grizzard, the earliest known forebear, was born about 1730, probably in Sussex County, Virginia. The name of his wife is unknown, although it is thought she may have been a Hardy. Ambrose was the father of Hardy Grizzard and other children, only one of which is certain. He was also the father of Mary Grizzard, as is shown by Mary's marriage license in 1786. Ambrose Grizzard died before 1786, probably about 1777.

Hardy Grizzard was the father of Mary and Zilpha Grizzard who married Edmund and Richard Curd, respectively. Hardy married Elizabeth ~~Avery~~ Avery, daughter of Richard and Fortune Avery about 1778. After Elizabeth's death, he married Polly ?

Around 1798, Hardy and his family removed to Robertson County, Tennessee and here they lived and died. Whether Elizabeth, his first wife, died before his coming to Robertson County has not been ascertained yet, but this author expects this to be the case. Hardy Grizzard died in 1826. He and his wives had 8 children, most of whom were probably by his first wife.

While no record shows the personality traits of the Grizzards, it would be imagined that they were much like the Curds and Baileys, especially since like personalities tend to attract each other.

In naming their children, both Edmund and Richard Curd and their Grizzard wives used Grizzard names. William Hardy Curd, Jeol Hawes Curd, Edmund Grizzard Curd, Martha Mildred Curd - all of these have one or both names which trace back to the Grizzard lines.

OUR CURD GENEALOGY

The Curd genealogy follows and a few notes of explanation to help the reader are in order. While Edmund Curd was not the immigrant ancestor of our line, he is the earliest ancestor we have record of. Therefore, he will be used as the "fountain head" of this genealogy. Each forebear will have a number, and through these numbers, the reader can quickly check on the parentage of any ancestor listed. For example, Richard Curd, son of Edmund Curd, will have the number 2. When Richard is listed as head of his own household, he will again be listed with the number 2. By finding the number 2 in the generation preceding Richard's, the data on his parentage is readily available. Hence, if a child listed in his father's household has the number 100, then he will be listed in the next generation as head of his own household with that same number. Not all persons have continued genealogies. Some never married, others married and had no issue, and in some cases, data was not supplied to this author on that particular person. Therefore, those whose genealogy is continued in the next generation will be marked with an (*) when they are listed in their father's household.

To further aid the reader, the first name of the father of each person will be listed in parenthesis after his name, when they are listed as head of a household. After the father's name will appear the grandfather's first name and so forth on back to Edmund Curd, our earliest known ancestor. As an example, let us use this author's great-grandmother, Frances Jane Curd. She would be listed as: FRANCES JANE CURD³(William Hardy², Edmund¹). The small numbers indicate the generation.

Since no genealogy can ever really be complete and since new information will no doubt come to light after the printing of this booklet, the author plans to issue periodic Addendums until the genealogy seems complete. These Addendums will be made available to the owners of these booklets.
